I remember a time when a commercial operation who had trucks and funds we could only dream of, told us they were going out bush. They would take out refreshments we could not match. They can speak to someone who they know will not be judgemental. There is one issue I have found which the rank and file will actually agree with the hierarchy about. That is that the hierarchy actually lets Everyman's exist in the system. To this day, I can tell you for sure, that Chiefs of Defence will react with genuine shock if they think a service like ours might end. I am happy to say, the profit seeking "Taj Mahal" trucks never materialised. I do not know why, but in the 20 years since I have never heard any suggestion they are returning.

Remembering Stewart Denson

Promoted to glory - August 2022 Served honourably in Everyman's Welfare Service 1993 - 2001

Stewart was a Carriage Builder in NSW Rail before joining the Army as an Infantry soldier. Upon his return from serving in Malaysia, he and other soldiers were involved in a terrible Military accident at Puckpunyal that claimed the lives of some of his friends. This impacted Stewart throughout his life. He was awarded the Commanding Officers Commendation.

Stewart became a Christian while serving in the Army.

Some years later, Stewart and Michelle were accepted as Representatives of Everyman's Welfare Service and as Chief Commissioner, I was privileged to participate in their Commissioning Service at the New Covenant Congregational Church in Nowra NSW. The church wholeheartedly affirmed their calling and sent them out as missionaries.



Stewart initially served as the Everyman's Representative at the 1st Recruit Training Battalion Kapooka NSW and became well accepted by the staff and recruits and was noted for his caring manner, Christian faith and his understanding of Army life. One example - after a Graduation Parade, a young soldier introduced his parents to Stewart. They explained that their son had found the going really tough, particularly as he was shy and retiring by nature. In his letters to them, he said that if it had not been for the service that Everyman's provided both in the Field and in the Centre with its relaxed atmosphere, he would never have made it. Stewart was able to explain the role and motivation of Everyman's in expressing God's love and care to soldiers.

Stewart and Michelle were next posted to Latchford Barracks at Bonegilla with their family to represent Everyman's to Army Apprentices and Adult Trainees preparing to enter a trade in the Army.

The newly built Everyman's Centre was state of the art and situated centrally over three floors surrounded by many other facilities including the mess hall and an in-door olympic size swimming pool. Stewart and Michelle and their family became a defacto family for many young people, a shoulder to lean on, someone to confide in, a place to seek friendly advice, and a homely welcome. Many young people found the Lord through the witness of Stewart and Michelle and other Reps when there.

Following this came a posting to Darwin and apart from the Center there, this posting involved a lot of Field work and Military Exercises. Stewart was known for getting down to the 'nitty gritty' in people's questions and lives and found acceptance amongst the officers and men, both out in the field and Defence Personnel in the neighbourhood.

For example - On one occasion, a young soldier declared his Christianity upon seeing Allen Pipes and Stewart carrying an urn through the tropical heat of the day so that soldiers could have a cold drink. The soldier pointed this out to his mates and declared, "this is what real Christians do - they serve and bless others" The same young soldier introduced Stewart to a young man who was born in PNG to Missionary parents. He had turned his back on the Lord but now wanted to renew his faith on his new posting in Darwin.

General the Honourable Sir Peter Cosgrove AK CVO MC (Retd) served with Stewart in East Timor in a hostile environment during 1999 - 2000. He summed up Stewart's service, when he learned of his passing, in an email to the family, which read:

QUOTE-" I was very sad to be informed of Stewart's passing. I remember him well as a caring energetic Representative of his wonderful Service. Please extend to Michelle and his loved ones my deepest condolences both personally and on behalf to the countless men and women in uniform whose spirits were uplifted by his ministry. May he rest in peace. Thank you for reaching out with this sad news. We will remember him in our prayers."

To God be the Glory! We honour Stewart's faithfulness and selflessness in living the Gospel.
